How We are Making IT Good for Society as a Member Group

Our programme of events demonstrates that the branch promotes IT beyond its immediate membership. A large proportion of attendees are non-members. For the second time, we ran a Hackathon as an all-day event on a Saturday and it attracted young people from local schools and colleges. It also consolidated our relationship with officers from Cyber Prevent, the regional Cyber Crime Unit of Hertfordshire Police, who were in attendance.

The branch serves an area of the country which includes parts of Buckinghamshire and Bedfordshire, as well as the eponymous county. We have approximately 1460 members at all grades, and we meet approximately once per month from September to June.

This year has seen the consolidation of our relationship with Cyber Protect, through our Hackathon attended by students from local schools and colleges. Our March event was the culmination of our reaching out to a local organisation, the British Standards Institution. We continue to support computing students at the University of Hertfordshire through student prizes and membership of BCS.

Committee

About the Committee

The committee met seven times during the year at Advanced Collection Systems Ltd and we would like to thank them for their continuing support. Each meeting lasted for approximately two hours and our committee included two new members. We are pleased to report that as a consequence we have improved not only the average age of the committee but also the gender imbalance!

This was the third year in the role for the chair and secretary and first year in the role for the treasurer.

We reported last year on two factors that had had a serious detrimental impact on the work and workload of the committee. The first was the introduction of a new event booking system, Eventbrite. We are disappointed to report that the branch has continued to suffer because of errors in the accuracy of information fed into the system by BCS HQ. We have been in contact with other branches and have confirmed that we are not alone in experiencing annoying issues with the setting up of our events on Eventbrite. By definition, members of BCS are computer literate and understand why computer systems produce the results they do. We therefore are well placed to know when we are provided with explanations by HQ staff which are inconsistent with reality. This is very frustrating.

The second factor was the stance that BCS took with respect to GDPR. Branches are not allowed direct access to any data. Indirect access is allowed through HQ, but the quality is variable. The situation has worsened as there are now two membership databases which are mutually inconsistent. Even the relatively simple task of producing a membership report has been compromised.

Notwithstanding these frustrations, the committee of BCS Hertfordshire remains passionate and hardworking.

Three longstanding members of the committee, Bob Thurlby, Malcolm Appleford and Mike Pickup, have announced their intention to step down from the committee. We would like to thank them for their numerous contributions over the years and wish them well as they focus on other things.
